<b>First-Year Writing:</b>	Complete English (ENGL) 110, Introduction to Academic Writing, or one of the approved course credit combinations satisfying the first-year writing general education requirement.		<b>Math/Logic:</b> Complete 6 credit hours from the list of approved courses satisfying the math or logic general education requirement.
<b>Foreign Language:</b>	Complete the 202-level or its equivalent or demonstrate proficiency at that level of an approved course satisfying the foreign language general education requirement.		<b>Natural Science:</b> Complete 8 credit hours of an introductory or higher sequence (of which 2 credit hours must be earned in the accompanying laboratories) from the list of approved course sequences satisfying the natural science general education requirement.
<b>History:</b>	Complete one course in pre-modern history and one course in modern history from the list of approved courses satisfying the history general education requirement (6 credit hours). The two courses do not have to be taken from the same department or in sequence.		<b>Social Sciences:</b> Complete 6 credit hours from the list of approved courses satisfying the social science general education requirement.

<p><b>Note 1:</b> The entry level business courses (DSCI 232, ECON 200, ECON 201, MATH 250 and MATH 120) are the building blocks of a solid business education. The concepts you learn in these classes will be used throughout your upper level business classes. Therefore, it is important that you LEARN these concepts rather than just memorizing them the night before a test. Students struggling in these courses should seriously consider another major.</p> <p><b>Note 2:</b> Students are encouraged to declare their major in the School of Business as early as freshman year to receive additional academic advising and student engagement opportunities. All newly declared majors in the School of Business will have a one-time academic advising hold placed on their record which will be removed once they have met with their faculty advisor. Because of the large number of pre-requisites in the major, students should meet with their academic advisors every semester to make sure they are on track and to discuss career and/or graduate school goals.</p> <p><b>Note 3:</b> Students wishing to minor entrepreneurship should plan on taking ACCT 203 (during sophomore fall semester) it is a pre-requisite for ENTR 321. The entrepreneurship minor includes the following core course requirements: ECON 200, ENTR 200, ENTR 320, ENTR 321 and 3 additional courses from the following list of ENTR electives at least one of which must be ENTR 406 or ENTR 407: ENTR 335, ENTR 405, ENTR 406, ENTR 407, ENTR 451, MGMT 351, MGMT 377, MGMT 403.</p> <p><b>Note 4:</b> Establish your professional LinkedIn account</p> <p><b>Note 5:</b> The General Education First-Year Writing requirement should be completed within the first or second semester.</p> <p><b>Note 6:</b> First-Year Experience Requirement: All entering students with less than one year of college experience are required to complete a <a href="#">First-Year Experience</a> (First-Year Seminar (FYSM), a Learning Community (LC), or an Honors College First-Year Experience course) within their first three consecutive academic term.</p>

### Second Year Notes

**Note 1:** The entry level business courses (DSCI 232, ECON 200, ECON 201, MATH 250 and MATH 120) are the building blocks of a solid business education. The concepts you learn in these classes will be used throughout your upper level business classes. Therefore, it is important that you LEARN these concepts rather than just memorizing them the night before a test. Students who do not do well in these quantitative courses should consider a major outside of the School of Business.

**Note 2:** Currently enrolled, degree-seeking undergraduate students must declare a major no later than second semester of their sophomore year. All newly declared majors in the School of Business will have a one-time academic advising hold placed on their record which will be removed once they have met with their faculty advisor. Students should meet with their academic advisors every semester to make sure they are on track and to discuss career and/or graduate school goals.

**Note 3:** The entrepreneurship minor includes the following core course requirements: ECON 200, ENTR 200, ENTR 320, ENTR 321 and 3 additional courses from the following list of ENTR electives at least one of which must be ENTR 406 or ENTR 407: ENTR 335, ENTR 405, ENTR 406, ENTR 407, ENTR 451, MGMT 351, MGMT 377, MGMT 403.

**Note 4:** Students planning to study abroad at any time during their junior year should meet with advisors at the Center for International Education and then with the study abroad advisor in the School of Business Student Success Center.

### Third Year Notes

**Note 1:** All newly declared majors in the School of Business will have a one-time academic advising hold placed on their record which will be removed once they have met with their faculty advisor. Students should meet with their academic advisors every semester to make sure they are on track and to discuss career and/or graduate school goals.

**Note 2:** It is recommended that students take ECON 317 and ECON 318 in different semesters. Students struggling in MATH 120, MATH 250, ECON 200, ECON 201, ECON 317, ECON 318 or DSCI 232 should seriously consider another major.

**Note 3:** Choose 18 hours of 300-400 level economics courses to satisfy ECON electives. Up to six hours of 300-400 level finance courses may be used to satisfy the ECON electives. ACCT 203 and ACCT 204 are pre-requisites to FINC 303 which is a pre-requisite to all 300-400 level FINC courses.

**Note 4:** The entrepreneurship minor includes the following core course requirements: ECON 200, ENTR 200, ENTR 320, ENTR 321 and 3 additional courses from the following list of ENTR electives at least one of which must be ENTR 406 or ENTR 407: ENTR 335, ENTR 405, ENTR 406, ENTR 407, ENTR 451, MGMT 351, MGMT 377, MGMT 403.
