General Education Requirement			
First-Year Writing:	Complete English (ENGL) 110, Introduction to Academic Writing, or one of the approved course credit combinations satisfying the first-year writing general education requirement.		Math/Logic: Complete 6 credit hours from the list of approved courses satisfying the math or logic general education requirement.
Foreign Language:	Complete the 202-level or its equivalent or demonstrate proficiency at that level of an approved course satisfying the foreign language general education requirement.		Natural Science: Complete 8 credit hours of an introductory or higher sequence (of which 2 credit hours must be earned in the accompanying laboratories) from the list of approved course sequences satisfying the natural science general education requirement.
History:	Complete one course in pre-modern history and one course in modern history from the list of approved courses satisfying the history general education requirement (6 credit hours). The two courses do not have to be taken from the same department or in sequence.		Social Sciences: Complete 6 credit hours from the list of approved courses satisfying the social science general education requirement.
Humanities:	Complete 12 credit hours from the list of approved courses satisfying the humanities general education requirement with no more than 6 credit hours with the same acronym. <p>Note 1: The General Education First-Year Writing requirement should be completed within the first or second semester.</p> <p>Note 2: First-Year Experience Requirement: All entering students with less than one year of college experience are required to complete a First-Year Experience (First-Year Seminar (FYSM), a Learning Community (LC), or an Honors College First-Year Experience course) within their first three consecutive academic terms.</p> <p>Note 3: The Classics BA requires majors to take CLAS 101 or HIST 231 and CLAS 102 or HIST 232. There are no prerequisites for CLAS 101 or 102 and they may be taken in the first year. HIST 231 and 232 have a two-course prerequisite (6 credit hours: HIST 101-102, HIST 103-104, or HIST 115-116), and therefore they belong more naturally to a student's second year of study. Third Year Notes

Note 1: The Classics BA requires students to obtain an interdisciplinary understanding of ancient and modern cultures. Therefore, every major must take one course (3 credits) on a topic relevant to Classics with a non-CLAS designation. Examples from the list of Approved Classics Courses include: *Courses at or above the 300-level (GREK); Courses at or above the 300-level (LATN); *Teaching Latin in Elementary and Middle Schools (LING 385); *Ancient Greek Art (ARTH 214); Ancient Roman Art (ARTH 215); *Ancient Egypt and Mesopotamia (HIST 230); Ancient Greece (HIST 231); Ancient Rome (HIST 232); *History of Ancient Philosophy (PHIL 220); Special Topics courses in ARTH, HIST, PHIL, and RELS, when the content focuses on Classics. Other courses may be counted towards the degree requirements with the approval of the Chair of the Classics Department. If a student has completed the equivalent of Greek or Latin 202, then 100 and 200-level courses in the other Classical language will count toward the major. *Courses marked with an asterisk may not meet gen. ed. requirements.

Note 2: Courses cannot be double-counted for different Minors.

Note 3: The Classics Department encourages all of its students to include a study abroad experience into their program.
